RITTEN BY: BOB STEBE ARE YOU NOT ENTERTAINED?



We are a very entertained generation. No mátter what age grouping you may fall into, we are very well entértained. None of us blink an eye any longer at What's inside our latest issue: the number of streaming services or channels on our televisions. Of course, we all have our favorites. But I would guess that even with 100+ channels to choose from, you only watch the same 10. And going out to the movies (almost a thing of the past for many) has been a multi-theater event for enough time that current 40 year-ölds have never seen a theater showing just one movie at a time. And for those 40 years

MTV has brought us the experience of "watching" music instead of singing along with the radio. Cell phones are a small pocket-sized computer and entertainment system. It only takes a few idle minutes before the phone comes out to fill the space with entertainment. I love going to a live concert or the theater for a show on stage. Something about a live performance and the connection with the audience that cannot be matched by watching on a screen. Even sports are not so much a game or a contest, but entertainment, and often the athletes think of themselves that way. So why should worship be any different? Don't we want to see a good show when we come to worship? If someone asks, "How was worship?" do you not describe the performance of those up front, on the "stage?" Once I went to a memorial service at another church where the pastor invited those who wanted to share some thoughts to join him up on the "stage." And another ended the benediction on the opening day of the NFL with "Go Hawks!" So why should we not consider worship a form of entertainment?

Søren Kierkegaard was a Danish theologian, teacher and writer in the 1800's. In one of his books, Purity of Heart, he reflected on commitment. For him, commitment was not something that could be anything but total. Commitment is either all or none. With the theme of commitment grounding his writing, he then compared worship to a live

performance, a play.

"Alas, in regard to things spiritual, the foolish of many is this, that they in the secular sense look upon the speaker as the actor, and the listeners as theatergoers who are to pass judgment upon the artist. But the speaker is not the actor - not in the remotest sense. No, the speaker is the prompter. There are no mere theatergoers present, for each listener will be looking into his own heart. The stage is eternity, and the listener, if his is the true listener (and if he is not, he is at fault) stands before God during the talk. The prompter whispers to the actor what he is to say, but the actor's repetition of it is the main concern - is the solemn charm of the art. The speaker whispers the word to the listeners. But the main concern is earnestness: that the listeners by themselves, with themselves, and to themselves, in the silence before God, may speak with the help of the address. The address is not given for the speaker's sake, in order that men may praise or blame him. The listener's repetition of it is what is aimed for.



Pastors Peace Continued...



If the speaker has that responsibility for what he whispers, then the listener has an equally great responsibility not to fall short in his task. In the theater, the play is staged before an audience who are called theatergoers; but at the devotional ad dress, God himself is present. In the most earnest sense God is the critical theatergoer, who looks on to see how the lines are spoken and how they are listened to: hence here the customary audience is wanting. The speaker then is the prompter, and the listener stands openly before God. The listener, if I may say so, is the actor, who in all truth acts before God."

Søren Kierkegaard, *Purity of Heart is To Will One Thing*, Trans. Douglas Steere (New York: Harper and Brothers, 1948) pp.180-181.

In other words, Kierkegaard pointed out that we usually think of the pastor as the lead actor on stage and the other worship leaders in supporting roles. The praise band, pianist, etc. are all other actors in this performance. Which makes the congregation the audience responding to the actions on stage, just as any theater audience would. However, that is not the truth about worship. Worship is not entertainment, but an expression of commitment by the congregation. In reality, if we think of worship as theater, then those in the congregation are the ones on stage in the starring and supportive roles. The pastor, worship leaders, pianist, praise band are all in the role of prompters, coaches, guides, directors who help the actors/congregation to put out the best for the audience, which is God. Yes, worship is a performance, but not entertainment. We are not here to entertain God, but to honor God with praise and show our commitment with an excellent performance from every one of us.

Of course, not every actor on stage is proficient in every role, so only be concerned with your own performance and how it reflects your commitment to the God. It is through your performance in worship that you show your gratitude to the God who has given the ultimate performance for you in Jesus the Christ.



- Pastor Bob is continuing the weekly narrative lectionary video and discussion during the 40 Minute Monday study.




- Conversation on Faith and Inclusion to be organized by Pastor Bob for May 1st.

- Session voted to approve that Rev. Dr. Bob and Lisa Stebe may continue to occupy the HPC manse on a month-to-month basis with a 30-day notice to vacate by either the Stebes or HPC.
- In March we collected 97 books and 16 book bags for the children's book bank.
- May 29th service Sunday will be adopt-a-road. HPC has adopted a part of Rood Bridge Road, the Tualatin River on the south side of Rood Bridge Park to Larson Road. The adopt-a-road program requires a two-year commitment and two cleans ups a year.
- One area where people can help the HPC budget is by giving their portion of per capita (\$39).
- Website upgrade in process. A new logo design has been selected.
- We'll be having a terrarium-making class on May 14th (Saturday) details to follow.
- Tickets now available for Hops game (June 24th, 7pm, \$17/ticket).
- A series of videos (actually, streaming) called Prophetic Voices have been purchased and the plan is to offer more after-worship movies in the months ahead.
- We are planning a special coffee hour at the beginning of June.
- Youth event this month will be Geocaching.
- Cleaned gutter down spouts and put screening in place to prevent clogs. Planning a roof clean up when the weather dries.
- Stay safe and healthy.
